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1) INTRODUCTION

- a) Titus 3:3-7
- b) Grace is amazing and so contrary to human nature.
 - i) We want to do things ourselves.
 - ii) Materialism says to buy our way out.
 - iii) Politics say to legislate our way out.
 - iv) Militarism says to fight our way out.
 - v) Industry says to work our way out.
 - vi) Philosophy says to think our way out.
 - vii) Deception says to bluff our way out.
 - viii) But the grace of God is the way out.
- c) Paul told Titus (who was saved and living in Crete among those who were lost) that he should live like a Christian and display Christian character.
 - i) Titus 3:1-2
- d) This world is not our home.
 - i) We are pilgrims going home.
 - ii) We are on our way to glory.
 - iii) We are to demonstrate the wonderful grace of God to all of those around us.
- e) In today's message, we will be talking about our grace lives.
 - i) This is the life that we can have.
 - ii) We will see that the Apostle Paul divides our spiritual life up into three categories:
 - (1) The past.
 - (2) The present.
 - (3) The future.

2) OUR PAST GUILT (TITUS 3:3)

- a) This is what we used to be.
- b) Titus 3:3
 - i) The Apostle Paul talks about what our past guilt was intellectually, morally, and socially.
- c) Our past guilt intellectually:
 - i) We were foolish.
 - (1) Titus 3:3
 - (a) The word "foolish" here does not mean lacking in intelligence.
 - (i) A person can have a high IQ and be foolish.
 - (ii) The Bible says that great men are not always wise.
 - 1. Job 32:9
 - (2) 1 Corinthians 1:18-20
 - (a) If we are saved, then it is the power of God.
 - (b) If you are not saved, then it may seem foolish.
 - (3) If we are so smart, then why are we in such a mess?
 - (4) The cross that we preach is foolish to this world.

- (a) 1 Corinthians 1:18
- (b) We are saved by the cross alone, by grace alone, through faith alone, and in Christ alone.
 - (i) The statesmen, the philosophers, and the thinkers do not understand this.
 - 1. It is foolishness to them.
- (5) John 3:14-15
 - (a) The people had disobeyed God, and God sent fiery serpents into the camp.
 - (i) Numbers 21:4-9
 - (ii) The serpent is a symbol of sin.
 - (b) The people were dying.
 - (c) God told Moses to make a brazen serpent and put it upon a pole.
 - (i) Whoever looked at the serpent in faith would be healed of his snake bite.
 - (d) This is an Old Testament illustration of salvation.
 - (i) John 3:14
 - (ii) The brazen serpent represents the Lord Jesus.
 - 1. 2 Corinthians 5:21
 - 2. He took our sin and carried it to the cross.
 - 3. Brass is a symbol of judgment, and Jesus was sin being judged.
 - (e) In the Old Testament, the people were told to look and to live.
 - (i) They did not have to die.
 - (ii) God had made a provision.
 - (iii)But to some, it probably seemed foolish to look upon the brass serpent for healing.
 - 1. 1 Corinthians 1:18
 - 2. A person can refuse Jesus if they want to.
- ii) We were disobedient.
 - (1) Titus 3:3
 - (2) The word "disobedient" doesn't mean simply that we disobey.
 - (a) It has the idea of willful, obstinate, and stubborn disobedience.
 - (b) Disobedience in the light of truth; not wanting to know the truth.
 - (i) The problem is not in the mind but in the heart.
 - (ii) It has the idea of being unyielding.
- iii) We were deceived.
 - (1) Titus 3:3
 - (2) Why were we so willfully disobedient before we got saved?
 - (a) Because there is a devil who is the great deceiver.
 - (3) The Bible says that Satan deceives the whole world.
 - (a) Revelation 12:9
 - (4) No one like this would be saved apart from the grace of God.
- d) What we were morally:

- i) Titus 3:3
 - (1) "Serving divers lusts and pleasures" can be translated, "habitual slaves to all sorts of passions."
 - (a) That is how we were.
 - (b) We were simply living for ourselves.
- ii) Living in sin is not only a vise, but it is also a trap.
 - (1) The more we are into it, the deeper we sink.
 - (2) It may be sins of the back ally, the refined pleasures of the social club, or the niceties of this world.
 - (a) It does not make any difference.
 - (i) Sin is sin.
- e) What we were socially:
 - i) Titus 3:3
 - ii) The reason we hate one another is because we are hateful.
 - (1) The problem is in us.
 - (a) We cannot get along with other people because we cannot get along with ourselves.
 - iii) Over the years, there has been an increase in violent crime in America.
 - (1) The problem is sin.
 - (2) Those who have never committed a crime like this may think that they are alright.
 - (a) Self-righteousness is one of the worst sins of all.
 - (b) It is not the amount of sin but the fact of sin that condemns us.
 - (i) We are sinners.
 - 1. Sinners by birth.
 - 2. Sinners by nature.
 - 3. Sinners by choice.
 - 4. Sinners under condemnation.
- 3) PRESENT GRACE (TITUS 3:4-5)
 - a) Titus 3:4-5
 - b) It is rooted in the sovereign love of the Father.
 - i) Titus 3:4
 - (1) God loves us.
 - (a) We are blessed because God loves us.
 - (b) This is grace.
 - ii) Romans 5:8
 - iii) God does not love us because we are valuable.
 - (1) We are valuable because God loves us.
 - (a) That is what the Gospel is all about.
 - iv) Titus 3:5
 - (1) If it were by works of righteousness that we have done, then how could we save ourselves?
 - (a) Isaiah 64:6

- (i) We do not have any righteousness.
 - 1. Even our righteousness is as filthy rags in God's sight.
- v) Grace spells salvation not "do" and not "don't," but "done."
 - (1) It is not addition.
 - (a) There is nothing we can do that will take away what we have already done.
 - (2) It is not subtraction.
 - (a) There is nothing we can stop doing.
 - (3) Sin is sin and must be atoned for.
 - (4) If we try anything other than the grace of God, then we will be eternally lost.
 - (a) No matter what else we hold onto, if we are not linked by grace to the heart of God, then we are going to perish.
 - (b) Titus 3:5
- vi) If we were saved by works, then we could brag about it.
 - (1) Ephesians 2:8-9
 - (2) We are going to Heaven by the grace of God.
 - (a) All the glory, praise, and honor go to Him.
- c) It is the supernatural work of the Spirit.
 - i) Titus 3:5
 - ii) Salvation is supernatural.
 - (1) He regenerates us.
 - (a) He calls it "the washing of regeneration."
 - (i) Titus 3:5
 - (ii) This is not baptism.
 - 1. Water on our skin cannot take sin out of our hearts.
 - (b) Zechariah 13:1
 - (i) There is a fountain that we can wash in for sin and uncleanness.
 - (c) What is that fountain?
 - (i) Revelation 1:5
 - 1. The Lord Jesus Christ is called the faithful witness in this passage.
 - (ii) Revelation 7:14
 - (iii)We are not washed in water.
 - 1. We are washed in blood.
 - (d) 1 Corinthians 6:9-11
 - (i) We are sanctified.
 - (ii) In this passage of Scripture, he does not say such "are" you.
 - 1. You may have been a thief, an extortioner, or an adulterer.
 - 2. But when you were saved, you were washed whiter than snow in the precious blood of Jesus Christ.
 - a. You were made new.
 - b. 2 Corinthians 5:17
 - i. Old things are passed away.

- ii. They are buried in the grave of God's forgetfulness.
- (e) There is a washing of regeneration in the blood of the Lamb.
- (f) It doesn't make any difference what denomination you are; there's no other way to be saved than by the grace of God.
- (2) We are renewed by the Holy Ghost.
 - (a) He makes us new and keeps renewing.
 - (i) This means continued action.
 - (ii) Day by day, moment by moment, He renew us, restores us and refreshes us.
 - 1. Lamentations 3:22-23
 - (b) He does not just forgive and then say, "That's it."
- d) It is the saving death of the Son.
 - i) Titus 3:6
 - ii) Our Savior is God.
 - (1) Titus 3:4
 - (a) In this verse, God is called our Savior.
 - (2) Titus 3:6
 - (a) In this verse, Jesus Christ is called our Savior.
 - (3) Is God our Savior, or is Jesus Christ our Savior?
 - (a) The answer is yes.
 - (b) God our Savior; Jesus Christ died for us.
 - iii) There is the sacrificial work of the Savior.
 - (1) He provided Himself as an innocent sacrifice.
 - (2) He bore our sin.
 - (3) Jesus stepped out of Heaven, came to this Earth, lived a sinless life, and was brutalized.
 - (a) The Bible says that they pulled the beard from His face.
 - (i) Isaiah 50:6
 - (b) They mocked Him.
 - (4) Jesus Christ suffered as no one else has suffered.
 - (5) God the Father had to turn His back on Jesus.
 - (a) The Lord Jesus became sin.
 - (b) God the Father is of purer eyes than to behold sin.
 - (i) Habakkuk 1:13
 - (6) Jesus, who knew no sin, took our sin and carried it to the cross.
 - (a) 2 Corinthians 5:21
 - (b) That is grace.
- 4) OUR FUTURE GLORY (TITUS 3:7)
 - a) Titus 3:7
 - i) This passage talks about what is coming
 - (1) It's talking about our future.
 - ii) We will be heirs of God and joint heirs of Jesus Christ.
 - (1) A joint heir means that we share and share alike.

- (2) We inherit all things.
 - (a) Revelation 21:7
- (3) The best is yet to come.
- b) The Bible calls the Holy Spirit in our hearts, that we have right now, the down payment.
 - i) Ephesians 1:13-14
 - ii) When a person is going to buy something, they give "earnest" money.
 - (1) The Holy Spirit in our hearts is the earnest money.
 - iii) We get the full legacy later on.
 - (1) We do not have it all now; it is a future glory.
 - (a) This is the reason that this world is not our home.
 - (i) We are pilgrims just passing through.
- c) In the Old Testament, we read where Abraham sent his servant, Eliezer, to get a bride for Isaac.
 - i) Genesis 24
 - ii) Isaac is a picture in the Old Testament of the Lord Jesus Christ.
 - iii) Eliezer is a picture and a type of the Holy Spirit, who seeks a bride for Jesus.
 - iv) Abraham is a picture of God the Father.
 - (1) Abraham sent Eliezer to seek a bride for his son.
 - (2) God the Father is seeking a bride for His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ.
 - v) Abraham gave Eliezer incredible wealth.
 - (1) He had all the disposal of the father at his hand to go seek a bride.
 - vi) Eliezer went into a far country and found the one led of God, whose name was Rebecca.
 - vii) He had to convince Rebecca to go with him to marry a man she had never seen.
 - (1) She went with a man she had never seen to marry a man she had never seen.
 - (a) This is an illustration of how the Holy Spirit teaches us to love Jesus, whom having not seen we love.
 - (i) 1 Peter 1:8
 - (2) Eliezer told Rebecca about Isaac and how blessed she was going to be.
 - (3) Rebecca agreed to go back with Eliezer.
 - viii) Eliezer, representing the Holy Spirit, took treasures and gifts and gave them to Rebecca as they traveled.
 - (a) Perhaps he gave them to her when she became fearful and wondered if there was really an Isaac and if he was really that wonderful.
 - (b) Perhaps he would tell her that Isaac wanted her to have the gifts and that she would love Isaac.
 - ix) When she met Isaac, she had already heard so much about him that she knew him.
 - (1) Eliezer had done his job.

- (2) That is what the Holy Spirit does for us.
 - (a) He drops little gems into our hearts.
 - (b) He sees our fears and tears.
- d) Right now, we have the earnest of the Spirit.
 - i) But the Bible speaks of our future glory.
 - ii) We are going to inherit all things.
 - (1) Revelation 21:7

5) CONCLUSION

- a) When you receive Jesus, you receive the eternal life that is in Jesus.
 - i) You cannot have that life without having Jesus.
 - ii) In Him is life.
 - (1) Receive Him today.
- b) Salvation is a gift.
 - i) You receive it.
 - ii) You will never earn it.
- c) Do you know Jesus personally? If not, you can pray to Him today by asking Him to come into your life.
- d) Call upon Jesus today. Repent (turn) from your sins, and turn to Jesus. Ask Him to forgive you of your sins, and acknowledge Him as Lord of your life.
 - i) Romans 3:23
 - ii) Romans 10:9-10
 - iii) Romans 10:13
 - iv) Acts 16:31
 - v) John 3:16
