SERMON TITLE: Your Child: Wise or Otherwise

SERMON REFERENCE: Proverbs 1:20-22

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- 1) INTRODUCTION
 - a) The devil is letting loose with all of the artillery of Hell against our homes.
 - i) The devil knows that if he can hurt us at home, then he has hurt us all over.
 - b) Satan is the greatest home wrecker.
 - c) Jesus Christ is the greatest home builder.
 - d) Satan wants to bring discord into our homes.
 - e) Jesus wants to bring harmony into our homes.
 - f) It has been said that we spend the first half of our lives fighting with our parents and the last half of our lives fighting with our children.
 - i) That is not the way that God intended it.
 - g) We have to realize that something is drastically wrong.
 - i) We are a needy generation.
 - ii) There are children in prison.
 - iii) Many children live in broken homes.
 - iv) Children between the ages of seven and eleven have been given or are receiving psychiatric help.
 - v) Many teenage girls between the ages of twelve and seventeen will get pregnant and deliver a baby.
 - (1) This does not count the pregnancies that will end in abortion.
 - vi) Teenagers are being infected with venereal disease.
 - vii) Many children will contemplate or try suicide.
 - (1) Something is desperately and drastically wrong.
 - h) God has given us a special book in the Bible, the book of Proverbs, that tells us how to raise wise children.
 - i) Proverbs 1:20-22
 - (1) Another phrase for "simple ones" is "gullible teenagers."
 - (2) Another phrase for "scorners" is "smart alecks."
 - (3) Another word for "fools" is "rebels."
 - (4) First, he mentions the simple.
 - (5) Then, he mentions the scorner.
 - (6) And then, he mentions the fool.
 - (a) There is a definite progression here.
 - (b) This is the evolution of a fool.
 - i) No fool ever begins as a fool.
 - i) Fools are self-made with a lot of help from the parents.
 - ii) A child begins, as what the Bible calls, as simple.
 - iii) If the simple child is not dealt with, then he becomes a scorner.
 - iv) If the scorner is not dealt with, he then becomes a fool.
 - (1) Once he becomes a fool, there is hardly any help or hope for him.
 - j) In today's message, we will look at what God shows us in His Word about how to raise a wise child.
 - i) We will look at how to begin with a child when he is what the Bible calls simple and how to keep him from becoming a scorner and a fool.

2) THE GULLIBLE TEENAGER (PROVERBS 1:22)

- a) The Bible calls him a simple person.
 - i) This has nothing to do with his mental ability.
 - ii) Many people who were once simple are now surgeons, lawyers, doctors, or ministers.
 - iii) The word "simple" here comes from a root word which simply means "open."
 - (1) This is a person who is gullible or naïve.
 - (a) That is the way teenagers are.
- b) He loves simplicity.
 - i) Proverbs 1:22
 - ii) He loves being a carefree, happy teenager.
 - iii) He does not want to think about anything serious.
 - iv) Teenagers enjoy having it easy.
- c) He lacks understanding.
 - i) Proverbs 9:1-4
 - (1) This literally means "the one who lacks understanding."
 - ii) He may be intelligent, but he does not have understanding.
 - (1) This refers to spiritual wisdom and insight from God's Word.
- d) He is led easily.
 - i) Proverbs 14:15
 - (1) This is one of the greatest dangers that all teenagers face.
 - (2) The simple believes every word.
 - ii) He is a sitting duck for marketing, humanism, false religion, and sinful friends.
 - iii) He is open and naïve.
 - iv) He is going to believe something, whether it is right or wrong.
 - v) The power of peer-pressure, public opinion, and how people want to conform to what other people are doing is incredible.
 - (1) This is especially true about teenagers.
- e) He is living in danger.
 - i) Proverbs 22:3
 - (1) This is a chilling verse for the simple.
 - ii) A wise man can look down the road and prepare for the future, or he can see danger and get out of the way.
 - (1) But not the simpleton.
 - (a) This does not mean that he is stupid.
 - (i) He just cannot think about danger.
 - (b) That is the reason teenagers are liable to drink and drive.
 - (i) They cannot see the danger.
 - (ii) They cannot think out ahead.
- f) This is what the Bible calls the simple, and the world is full of them.
 - i) They are not bad kids; they are just simple.

- ii) They need to be taught.
- iii) They need to be given wisdom.

3) THE SCORNER (PROVERBS 1:22)

- a) If the gullible teenager (the simple) is not taught, then he becomes a scorner.
- b) The scorners delight in their scorning.
 - i) What is a scorner?
 - (1) In school, he is called a smart aleck.
 - (2) In business, he is called a cynic.
 - (3) In the university, he is called a scoffer.
 - (a) But they are all the same person, and the world is full of them.
 - ii) They are hard to reach for the Gospel.
 - iii) 2 Peter 3:3
 - iv) They have the devil's initials carved in their hearts, and their lives are covered with the fingerprints of sin.
 - v) They are the devil's delight.
- c) They defy instruction.
 - i) It is easy to teach a simple child, but it is hard to teach a scorner.
 - ii) Proverbs 13:1
 - iii) Once a child becomes a scorner, his ability to learn is difficult because he has a hardened attitude.
 - iv) You can tell a scorner, but you cannot tell him much.
 - (1) He will tune you out.
 - (2) He has ears, but he will not hear.
 - (3) When you talk to a scorner, it is like talking to a brick wall.
- d) He despises the good and the godly.
 - i) Proverbs 15:12
 - ii) Don't expect a scorner to ask for help and advice.
 - iii) He does not love the person who gives him advice.
 - iv) If you try to straighten out a scorner, then he will look at you as if he hates you.
 - (1) You rebuke him; he will insult you.(a) Proverbs 9:7-8
 - v) He feels that the good and the godly are his enemies.
 - (1) He hates his teachers, his parents, his pastor, and his Sunday school teacher.
- e) He is destined for destruction.
 - i) Proverbs 13:1
 - (1) He will not listen.
 - ii) Proverbs 13:13
 - (1) As a result, he will be destroyed.
 - iii) He can laugh his way into Hell, but he will not laugh his way out once he gets there.
- f) Yet, even for the scorner, there is some hope.

- g) The scorner is so much harder to reach than the simple.
- 4) THE REBEL (PROVERBS 1:22)
 - a) This is who the Bible calls the fool.
 - i) The simple and the scorner are known by what they love, but the fool is known by what he hates.
 - ii) The fool hates wisdom.
 - b) He rejects wisdom.
 - i) Proverbs 1:7
 - ii) You cannot get through to him.
 - iii) Proverbs 15:5
 - iv) He literally hates it.
 - c) He ridicules righteousness.
 - i) Proverbs 14:9
 - ii) Almost all of our entertainment mocks sin, especially the seventh commandment.
 - (1) Exodus 20:14
 - iii) A fool displays his foolishness by mocking sin.
 - d) He rejoices in iniquity.
 - i) Proverbs 15:20-21
 - ii) He actually loves his iniquity.
 - (1) It is a joy to him.
 - iii) His moral sense is so destroyed, he is so perverted, that he cannot tell the difference between good and bad.
 - (1) Isaiah 5:20
 - e) He is reserved for Hell.
 - i) Proverbs 17:10
 - ii) We cannot change him.
 - (1) Once he becomes a fool, it seems as though he has crossed the deadline.
 - iii) Don't stop praying for him, and maybe God in mercy will save him.
- 5) HOW TO DEAL WITH THE SIMPLE (PROVERBS 1:1-4)
 - a) Start early.
 - i) Start with a child before he is born, and give him to the Lord.(1) Then, continue wisely.
 - ii) How can the tragedy of a child becoming a fool be avoided?
 - (1) Start with the simple when he is young.
 - (2) God has given us the Bible to teach this child.
 - iii) Dr. Paul Meyers wisely said that there are five keys to being the right kind of parent:
 - (1) Love
 - (2) Discipline
 - (3) Constancy

- (4) Example
- (5) Headship
 - (a) All of these are involved in raising a child.
- b) One of the chief ways that the simple learn is by example.
 - i) He is open, and whatever example is set before him makes the greatest impression on him.
 - ii) Proverbs 19:25
 - (1) This is a key verse.
 - (2) It does not say to smite the simpleton, but to smite the scorner.
 - iii) Proverbs 21:11
 - iv) The simpleton, more than anything else, needs to see the scorner punished.
 - (1) He needs to understand that he cannot sin with impunity and get away with it.
 - v) When a child sees someone else punished, it has a great effect on him.
 - vi) The worst thing that could happen to teenagers is to have a permissive society where they do not see sin quickly punished.
 - (1) Ecclesiastes 8:11
 - (2) Teenagers need to be shown the wages of sin clearly and plainly.(a) They need to see the scorner being smitten.
 - vii) Let him see clearly and plainly.
 - (1) He doesn't understand; he thinks he's invincible.
 - (2) Proverbs 22:3
 - (3) Let him see the wages of sin.
- c) Guard his company.
 - i) Help him to avoid scorners and fools, smart alecks and rebels.
 - ii) Proverbs 13:20
 - (1) If you let your child run with fools, then he will be destroyed.
 - (2) Don't let your child link up with a rebel.
 - iii) Proverbs 22:10
 - (1) Fools and scorners don't need to be in company with the simple.
 - (a) If you let your naïve, gullible teenager get with fools and scorners, then before long he will become one.
 - (b) Don't let them corrupt your child.
 - (c) Teenagers are especially susceptible to peer pressure, whether it is good or bad.
 - (2) Cast out the scorner.
 - (3) A scorner should not be allowed to disrupt a school.
 - (a) Don't let him corrupt the whole class.
 - (4) The Bible doesn't say to cast him off but to cast him out.
 - (a) There is a difference.
 - (5) There are people in churches who want to disrupt the church.(a) We are to cast them out.
 - iv) Help him select his friends.

- (1) Make your house a haven for his friends.
- (2) Let your home be the happiest place on Earth.
- (3) Let him know that you love him and that you love his friends.
 - (a) But at the same time, you are watching his friends.
 - (i) Cast out the scorner and the rebel.
- v) See to it that the best people are invited into your home.
 - (1) Have notable and wise people as guests at dinner.
 - (a) Let your kids be seated at the table, listening and learning.
 - (b) That is the way they are going to learn.
- 6) HOW TO DEAL WITH THE SCORNER (PROVERBS 9:7-8)
 - a) Remember that scolding and lecturing a scorner does very little good.
 - i) Reproving a scorner does little, if any, good.
 - ii) Proverbs 15:12
 - iii) Scolding will probably increase his ability to sin.(1) Matthew 7:6
 - iv) You need to talk less and pray and love more.
 - (1) Then, wait for an open door.
 - (2) Proverbs 15:23
 - b) When you have a rebellious teenager, surround that teenager with your love.
 - c) Let him know where you stand on these issues.
 - i) Don't constantly be rebuking him, but be loving and pray.
 - (1) As you pray, God will open his heart at the right moment.
 - d) Do not shield him from the results of his sin.
 - i) Don't pamper him or facilitate him in his wickedness.
 - ii) Do not shield him from punishment.
 - iii) Proverbs 19:25
 - (1) If he does not learn from his punishment, then others will learn.
 - (2) This does not necessarily mean to smite him physically.
 - (a) There's more than one way to show him what the wages of his sin are.
 - e) Refuse to let him corrupt others.
 - i) Proverbs 22:10
 - ii) Don't let him ruin everything.
- 7) CONCLUSION
 - a) If you are a hurting parent, then God understands just how you feel because He lost his children, too.
 - b) God created some children, and He gave them everything they needed.
 - i) No one can say that He didn't raise them right.
 - ii) No one can say that He didn't love them.
 - iii) No one can say that He didn't spend time with them.
 - iv) No one can say that He didn't carefully teach them.

- v) He warned them that their future depended upon their choices, yet they did wrong.
 - (1) God made them human beings, and God gave them a choice.
 - (2) A bad influence came from the outside, and by their own choice and free will, they rebelled against a loving Father.(a) Genesis 3:1-6
- c) You can be a good parent and lose a child.
- d) Proverbs 22:6
 - i) This is a proverb and a principle.
- e) Even reading the Bible, you will see a hurting parent.
 - i) God is in the same place that you are.
 - ii) God is agonizingly watching your children hurt themselves and hurt others.
 - iii) Yet, God refuses to step in and make them machines.
 - (1) He will not do it.
 - (2) He will not do it with you, either.
 - (a) God is looking down from Heaven right now at some grown, rebellious children.
 - (i) And He is stretching out His hands, and He is saying, "Come to Me."
- f) With so many forces pulling at our children, may the Lord help us to be wise parents to raise wise children.
- g) Are you a wise child of God, or are you rebelling against Him?
- h) Do you know Jesus personally? If not, you can pray to Him today by asking Him to come into your life.
- i) Call upon Jesus today. Repent (turn) from your sins, and turn to Jesus. Ask Him to forgive you of your sins, and acknowledge Him as Lord of your life.
 - i) Romans 3:23
 - ii) Romans 10:9-10
 - iii) Romans 10:13
 - iv) Acts 16:31
 - v) John 3:16
